OUTPUTS

Outputs are tangible or direct results of a process, task, or activity (ex: 120 meals were served, 100 nights of shelter provided, etc.) It is HOW you achieve your goals.

You must choose at least ONE output from your chosen pillar. It is encouraged to choose as many that are applicable to your work. Others may be from your chosen pillar or any pillar.

Additionally, if awarded funding, you will be asked to provide demographic data on your midyear and final reports that includes total unduplicated number of participants served, gender and county. Reporting on race and ethnicity will not be required but highly encouraged as it strengthens our ability to understand who is being served and tells a more accurate story about community needs.

Please note, Community Resiliency outputs and outcomes are not included in the grant process as they reflect UWDATS internal programs/partnerships.

OUTCOMES

Outcomes are long-term effects or benefits that occur as result of a process, task, or activity (ex: improved brain health, decreased homelessness, etc.) It is **WHAT** you want to achieve.

You must choose a total of three outcomes to report on. **Two outcomes must be from your chosen pillar** and one can be from any of the three pillars. It is encouraged to choose as many that are applicable to your work.

Additionally, if awarded funding, you will be asked to provide success stories related to your chosen outcomes on your midyear and final reports.

Healthy Communities—Health and well-being is improved for all.

1. #/% of participants who report they have been stabilized (avoiding hospitalization, involvement with law enforcement, isolation, harm, able to function at work/school, etc.).
2. #/% of participants who demonstrate appropriate management of their physical and/or brain health issues.
3. #/% of participants who increased knowledge of healthy eating habits and/or increased physical activity.
4. #/% of participants who increased their knowledge of substance misuse risks.
5. #/% of participants report an increased understanding of issues related to intimate partner violence and/or sexual assault, including gaining awareness of available resources and support options.
6. #/% of participants who report feeling more secure about food and meals, and/or indicated that participation in the program has enabled them to avoid skipping meals.
7. #/% of participants who report a reduction in transportation barriers.
8. #/% of participants who were connected to needed supports such as doctor appointments, social services, socialization activities, food, hygiene or another needed supplies, etc.

Youth Opportunity—Young people will realize their full potential.

1. #/% of youth achieving developmental milestones.
2. #/% of parents/guardians who increase engagement and report having resources, tools, and information needed to support their child's development and school success.
3. #/% of youth who indicate an increase of more than one caring adult in their life.

Financial Security—Every generation is creating a stronger financial future.

1. #/% of participants who develop their soft skills (ex: communication, teamwork, problem solving, time management, etc.)
2. #/% of participants who enrolled in or earned job relevant licenses, certificates, and/or credentials.
